

Communication Skills for Social Workers

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Good communication practice, from bureaucratic to situation, or problem of rent, or writing need to be able to cope with the diversity to be able to interact and use them effectively.

Skills can be practised in an interactive way at a manual level. These skills will take users and fellow students in private study, immediate work with service users, or in scaffolding you when you go to work.

Interpersonal skills in riding a bike, cycling, and walking, say or do next is inherently linked to the behaviour of others.

The aim is to promote readers thinking, reflection and critique. As far as possible, the approaches suggested have some basis in research evidence about what appears to be useful and acceptable to service users, and it is grounded in social work with persons including ourselves.






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The most important characteristic of a social worker is their empathy. The vast majority of people you work with are in a state of crisis and emotional distress. Therefore you must be able to offer a caring, understanding, and empowering environment for them. In other words, you must be able to place yourself in their shoes. Additionally, just as important as it is for you to understand the plights of others, you must also make yourself relatable. Clients may be less apt to open up and discuss issues if they feel you're someone who is perpetually out of touch with those they work with.

Social workers see difficult cases every day, and this inevitably tests your emotional strength. Clients may be dealing with physical or mental abuse, drugs, alcoholism, poverty, financial hardships, bereavement, or a number of other challenging life events. Social workers can't let it get to you. You must be able to bear others' burdens.

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SOCIAL WORK PRACTICE IN COMMUNITY

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Social workers in the field of community development can be found in many areas of practice and a variety of settings. The work is often not situated within legislated programs, and workers may or may not be required to be registered with the provincial regulatory body. Community practice can involve community economic development such as improving local economies in rural areas experiencing out-migration, or it can include working with citizens, groups, and organizations to interface with large systems, institutions, and the political process. The identity of "community" varies widely and changes depending on the context of the specific issue or social problem. Social workers who practise from a community development or community organizing perspective attempt to address the systemic issues that create social problems. In many cases, they may also be engaged in the kinds of individual problem-solving practices embodied in many social work positions.

Community social work involves understanding the power dynamics and social relations that govern the relationships between various structures and diverse communities and working to achieve social justice through structural change. If the issue is poverty, for example, a social worker practising from a community perspective may focus on the political economy that creates these conditions. This may include trying to address the policies that perpetuate poverty or organizing groups around the issue to lobby decisionmakers for change.

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
